### **CMRB** Goals

The Board has been established to pursue **five (5) goals**:

- 1. Become proactive partners in community problem solving;
- 2. Strengthen relationships of respect, cooperation, and trust within and between police and communities;
- 3. Impact education, oversight, monitoring, hiring practices, and mutual accountability of Stockton Police Department and the community;
- 4. Ensure fair, equitable, and courteous treatment for all; and
- 5. Create methods to establish the public's understanding of police policies and procedures, and recognition of exceptional services in an effort to foster support for the police.

### CMRB Purpose

The purpose of the CMRB is to support the City's efforts to meet the five goals and support the City in its ongoing effort to collaboratively:

- promote comprehensive public safety strategies;
- build, enhance, and expand relationships with our diverse local communities; and
- influence the acquisition and distribution of resources in support of this effort.

The CMRB will deliver information, analysis, advice, and recommendations to the City Manager in order to guide the ongoing, continuous improvement of community-police relations.







#### Mobile Community Response Team:

Resolves Behavioral Health Calls in Stockton through In Person and Phone de-escalation


From Sept-November there have been 42 initial calls for care that are self-reporting community members who called MCRT that have been seen at BHS (1212 California St) in the last year.

With 67 additional calls for follow up for CM for BHS patients.






From Sept-November there have been 29 times where MCRT has shown up for an in-person PD request and on average PD is able to leave after 10 min and MCRT stays for an additional average of 22 min saving the PD 638 min of officer time to move on to new calls in the community




#### **ZIPCODES**

95207 has yielded the most calls for 5 straight months, with an average of 150 calls monthly.











### **Monthly Forecast Zones**





The number of arrest charges in 2023 (7,982) increased 1% when compared to the same time in 2022 (7,888).




### 2023 Top 5 Arrest Charges




## Top 5 Charges Over Time

## Juvenile Arrest Top 5 Charges
















## Juvenile Arrest Demographic




#### Use of Force 2019 – 2023

January - December Use of Force Incidents by Year




## Use of Force Suspects 2023


The number of use of force suspects in 2023 has **decreased 51%** compared to the same time in 2022. January – December 2023










#### Complaints January - December


When comparing the same timeframes, complaints in 2023 decreased 22% compared to 2019.


The majority of complaints in 2023 were misconduct (Category A) complaints.
